

<u>Objective of the programme:</u> Sensitization of the non teaching staff of the University about the Gender issues.

<u>Speaker:</u> Prof Anjali Gandhi, former Dean, Faculty of Social sciences and professor of social work at Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi.

Professor Gandhi has been In charge of women studies Centre, Chairperson of University complaints committee on sexual harassment and Chairperson for formulation of policy for protection of women at Jamia Milia University for several years. She has served as project director for many government projects related to women and children issues. She has also been one of the Director for training counsellors for HIV/AIDS a project sanctioned by Global fund Geneva.

She has also done an anthropological study on Indians in Panama (Central America) which was published by Ministry of Education, Panama.

Recipient of various awards she has authored several books and has written extensively on issues of women and children. Besides contributing articles in various books, journals and newspapers, she had also made various presentations at Human Rights commission at Geneva way back in 1998. She has also served on governing Boards of Various Universities including Tata institute of social sciences.

#### **Brief Report of the programme:**

The war of genders, with the swords of distrust and pain has gone long enough and thousands of women have proven their worth to this world, but somewhere the disparity is still prevalent and it is high time that the society let go of their bigotry and false notions. Gender Sensitisation involves creating awareness about gender issues and



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working towards and creating an enabling environment of gender justice where men and women can work together with a sense of personal security and dignity. Its a movement that focuses on equal participation of women and men in decision-making, equal access & control on the resources, equal opportunities in employment and equivalent regard in all aspects of their life and livelihood so that both genders can enjoy their human rights without any constraint.

The theory is based on single entity i.e respect.....respect for everyone irrespective of their genders. The need for this sensitivity has been felt and realized all across the globe as Instilling positive thoughts on gender issues will enable us to refrain from practicing gender discrimination from work place and even at home.

Keeping these in mind, Internal Quality Assurance Cell of SGT University took this initiative to sensitize all the students, teaching and non-teaching staff about this issue. This was the third workshop in this series targeted only at the no teaching staff of University.

The guest speaker for the same was Dr Anjali Gandhi, Former Dean, Faculty of Social sciences, Jamia Milia islamia, New Delhi.

Professor Gandhi beautifully explained that men and women are individual personalities in their own with individual characteristics. No one if powerful and no one is powerless but the amalgamation of both is required to build a solid foundation of home and society in general.

Madam also stressed that senstitivity about gender should begin at home, If we are able to bring a change among our family and among our near ones, bit by bit change will be seen in the society. Gender discrimination should not be practiced at workplace or at home. Madam also throw light on the fact that Gender does not include only men and women, it includes transgenders also and Gender sensitization is the sensitivity and respect for everyone irrespective of their genders.
